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MCAS Yuma School Liaison Program

School Liaison Program (SLP) Overview

The School Liaison is the critical link between families, commanders, communities, and schools to improve education outcomes, quality of life, and operational readiness for Marine Corps families. The mission of the SLP is to promote awareness of the unique educational needs of military connected children and facilitate successful school transitions. School Liaisons serve on every major Marine Corps installation and in every branch of service. School Liaison Officers (also called SLO's) are here to assist families with their child's preK-12 education needs.

Preparing for Your Move to Yuma

Military connected children move 3 times more than their non-military connected peers and typically change schools 6-9 times over the course of their K-12 academic careers. Preparing to move to a new installation is critical to your child's academic success and future. Consider the following suggestions to prepare them for the move and help make their transition smooth.

- Talk about Yuma and research things to do and activities your child enjoys. Find activities that you can do together as a family. Research sports and extracurricular activities available at your child's new school and how to participate in them and get a head start on reaching out to coaches, teachers, and activity leaders.
- Take time (especially with older children, such as middle and high school aged children) to do activities that can help transition their current friendships to long-distance. Activities to consider are year book signing, scrapbooking, creating and maintaining an address book with friends' contact info, asking a favorite teacher to write your child a letter of encouragement, plan a farewell get together with friends, etc.
- Keep routines as consistent as possible leading up to, during, and after the move. Children thrive on routines and even small routines such as bedtime stories, family game nights, and schoolwork all give children a sense of normalcy, security, and peace of mind. Children who maintain consistent routines adapt better to their new location with fewer issues.
- Make sure not to pack sentimental items in your household goods that the movers will pick up. Be sure to pack comfort objects such as blankets and stuffed animals and important documents (especially schoolwork, report cards, transcripts, immunization records, etc.) in a bag that will travel with you or on your person during your move.
- Consider creating an education binder to keep your child's academic records and achievements in one place.

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- Get children excited about the move by talking about the positives, such as being able to pick out and decorate a new room, meet new friends, try new foods (tacos and sunsets in Yuma are amazing!), and explore new places.

Youth Sponsorship

Youth sponsorship is how a school and/or receiving installation helps incoming youth establish relationships with local youth or youth organizations who can support them during their transition to Yuma.

Many schools in Yuma have student ambassador programs that assign buddies to new students when they arrive at their new school. Ask your child's school about their student ambassador program and how you can get your child paired up with a student in their class to be their buddy from the first day of school.

Families are also encouraged to take advantage of free resources that support military children during times of transition, offered by Sesame Street for Military Families (best for young children through primary grades) and Boys & Girls Club of America My Future (best for elementary through college!)

Talk about the positive aspects of moving and experiencing new areas. ○ Help your child to explore the local area before the move using technology. All schools and districts now maintain websites, and many heavily impacted school districts have pages dedicated to military families. ○ If your orders require that your family relocate before the end of the current school year, make sure to notify your child's current school as soon as possible. ○ Make copies of your child's current textbook cover, table of contents and the course syllabus to bring to your new school. ○ Contact your child's current school to arrange for unofficial copies of the all necessary school records that you can hand carry with you during the move and provide to the receiving school upon arrival. ○ Bring samples of current school work your child has produced. If you will be arriving after tryouts have occurred for a favorite extra curricular activity, create a short video introducing your child and highlighting his or her skills in action; it might help reserve a spot on the team. ○ Find out if the new school requires testing and/or prerequisites in order to place students at the appropriate level for their skills. It might be possible to arrange for those tests before you arrive, so you are good to go when you register your child. ○ Be sure to pay any outstanding fees at your current school, return library books and any other items belonging to the school. If those items are not cleared, there could be delays with transcripts. ○ Last but not least, make sure to contact your School Liaison right when you get orders. School Liaisons are subject matter experts on preK-12 education and local school communities, and can help ease the transition for everyone involved.

Military Interstate Compact

Families are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the provisions of the military interstate compact, which is state law in all 50 states and Washington D.C. The rules of the compact are designed to ease common education related transition issues and could make your next school move a lot smoother! These rules apply to public, charter, and DoDEA schools. MIC3 | MILITARY INTERSTATE CHILDREN'S COMPACT COMMISSION

WHAT IS THE COMPACT?
The Compact deals with the challenges of military children and their frequent relocations. It allows for uniform treatment as military children transfer between school districts in member states. Note: The Compact only applies to public schools.

STUDENTS COVERED

Children of the following:

- Active duty members of the uniformed services, including members of the National Guard and Reserve on active duty orders (Title 10)
- Members or veterans who are medically discharged or retired for one year
- Members who die on active duty, for a period of one year after death
- Uniformed members of the Commissioned Corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), and United States Public Health Services (USPHS)

STUDENTS NOT COVERED

Children of the following:

- Inactive members of the National Guard and Reserves (Not Title 10)
- Members now retired not covered above
- Veterans not covered above
- Other Department of Defense personnel, federal agency civilians and contract employees not defined as active duty
- Members other than the uniformed personnel of NOAA and USPHS

Living On Base

While there are no schools located on the installation, families who live in on base housing are zoned for our local public school districts, *Yuma Elementary School District #1 (YESD1)* and *Yuma Union High School District #70 (YUHSD)*. The Yuma Education Consortium (YEC) provides bus transportation for children living in on- base housing who attend the YESD1 or YUHSD schools that they are zoned for.

Yuma Education Consortium (YESD1 & YUHSD Transportation) – (928) 502-8840

Families who live off base BUT in 16th Street Housing (which is military housing that is located 6 miles off base) are zoned for local public school districts *Crane School District #13 (Crane Schools)* and *Yuma Union High School District #70 (YUHSD)*. Bus transportation is NOT provided since 16th street housing is located within a 2 mile radius of these schools.

On-Base School Bus Transportation

The schools that MCAS Yuma is zoned for provide transportation for all students who live on base. Additionally, several schools and districts also offer transportation to families living on base whose children attend schools outside of the attendance boundary for MCAS Yuma. These schools provide bus transportation to and from the MCAS Yuma Youth Center, building 1050, only. They do not pick up and drop off in base housing. Children do not need to be enrolled in the Youth Center School Age Care program to utilize transportation offered by these schools. Parents must register for bus transportation directly with the school.

Living Off Base

Families living off base have several options for K-12 schools. Please note that these options are available to families who live on base as well.

1. Attend your zoned school

- This option means that your child attends the school that you are zoned for, based on your home address. This will be a public school. Students who attend their “home” school (the school they are zoned for) will be provided bus transportation, with few exceptions. *If you need assistance identifying which school you are zoned for, contact the School Liaison. Students are guaranteed admission to their “home” school.*

2. Apply for “Open Enrollment” to attend a different school

- This option is for families who would like their child to attend a different **public school** than the one they are zoned for. Families will be asked to fill out an open enrollment form when they go to register their child for school. Children applying to attend a school on open enrollment are accepted on a space available basis and WILL NOT be provided bus transportation by the school. Open enrollment admission is NOT a guarantee. Parents are encouraged to contact schools to view currently grade level availability.

3. Apply at a charter or private school

- If interested in having your child attend a charter or private school, contact that school directly to ask about requirements for enrollment. All private schools charge tuition as well as some charter schools (particularly for children enrolled in kindergarten). Parents are encouraged to ask about transportation offerings as private schools generally do not offer transportation.

4. Homeschool

- See homeschool section of this packet for specific guidance or contact the SLO to discuss homeschool options.

BLUF: Children are only guaranteed admission to the public school for which they are zoned.

Parents may choose to enroll their children in different schools, but remember spaces at charter/private schools fill quickly, open enrollment is not a guarantee, and transportation and tuition are additional considerations. Always make the public school you are zoned for your primary schooling option.

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Yuma Area Schools

Grades Served: Kindergarten – 8th grade

YESD1 operates 13 elementary schools, 5 middle/junior high schools, 1 fully online school (Digital Learning Academy), and limited preschool programs. YESD1 hosts AZ First Things First, Quality First, Tuition Based, and Special Education preschool programs at several of their elementary schools.

Grades Served: Kindergarten – 8th grade

CSD operates 8 elementary schools, 2 middle schools, and 1 magnet school. CSD also offers preschool and Special Education preschool programs at select campuses.

SSD11 operates 6 elementary schools and 1 middle school.

YUHSD also offers limited tuition-based preschool through their Early Childhood CTE programs on Gila Ridge High School and San Luis High School campuses.

While YESD1, YUHSD, Crane SS, and Somerton SD are the closest public school districts to the installation, Yuma County, Arizona is home to 9 independently operated public school districts as well as a wide variety of public charter schools and private schools. Purple Star Schools



AZ House Bill 2246 established the **Purple Star School Program** in Arizona in April 2024. The Purple Star School designation is a voluntary designation awarded to a qualifying school from the Arizona State Department of Education (ADE). Interested K-12 schools may apply to receive the designation after demonstrating successful implementation of state mandated best practices for supporting military connected students.

- Accepting applications in mid Feb/early March
- All private schools are parochial
- Apply directly with the school

- Prepare to pay application and registration fees OOP
- No deadline to apply, but apply early as seats fill quickly**



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Preschool

Preschool options off base in Yuma are varied and have varying age and income eligibility requirements to attend. Arizona does not have universal preschool or transitional kindergarten programs. Preschool programs offered by a local public school district will only enroll children that live within the district's attendance boundary. Active-duty military families are eligible to enroll children in preschool at the Child Development Center on base. Researching Schools

Researching to find the “perfect” new school for your child can be exciting, but also challenging. Finding reliable information on the internet is increasingly difficult, so it's recommended that you choose your sources wisely as you conduct your research. Here are a few suggestions in order of reliability, listing the most reliable source first and the least reliable source last:

1. Visit the School or Call to Speak to the Principal/Asst. Principal

You can learn much by a school visit and a conversation with their leadership. If in person visits aren't possible, ask for a virtual tour. Many schools are happy to accommodate prospective families. Request a list of recommended questions to ask from the School Liaison to guide you when speaking to the school leadership.

2. Contact your School Liaison Officer

The School Liaison Officer (SLO) is the installation subject matter expert on all matters involving K-12 education within their area of responsibility. They work closely with the schools and districts that serve military students and can answer many questions that parents have about schools in Yuma.

3. School Report Card Data

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The Arizona Department of Education assigns letter grades to public and charter schools in Arizona based on a variety of factors, including academic performance. School letter grades are generally a good indicator of how well a school does in ensuring students succeed, but won't answer all of your questions such as specific school initiatives, academic programs, extracurricular activities, sports, special education, etc. Those questions are best directed at school leaders or your SLO.

4. School Ranking & Real Estate Websites

Parents can find very general information about schools on school ranking and real estate websites such as school digger, great schools, niche, public school review, zillow, realtor.com, etc. Rankings published on these sites are not reliable and school attendance boundaries may be very outdated. Use this information with caution.

5. Anecdotes & Social Media

Personal anecdotes or comments in community pages on social media regarding schools are typically fraught with misinformation and only provide very biased points of view without giving families a complete picture, be those stories positive or negative. This information is probably the least reliable source and should be considered carefully along with other reliable sources of information such as talking to school leadership directly and/or the SLO.

Private Schools & Students with Special Needs

Families who choose to send their children to private school should be aware that private schools are not legally required to provide special education evaluations or equitable services to children who have or need an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) or 504 accommodation plan. It is the sole legal responsibility of public schools (including charter schools) to evaluate students to determine eligibility for special education services and to provide equitable services to students who qualify. If your child has a current IEP or 504 plan and you intend to enroll them in a Yuma private school, contact the school directly to ask if and how the school will be able to provide the support your student needs. Only a public school district can create, modify, or renew an IEP or 504 plan for a student. Families who have a child with exceptional needs are encouraged to speak with the School Liaison before enrolling in private school to discuss options for services and supports. Enrollment Laws in AZ

Required Enrollment (ARS 15-802)

- Children between the ages of 6 and 16 must be enrolled in school and at a minimum, must study math, reading, grammar, science and social studies.

Kindergarten Eligibility (ARS 15-821)

- Students must be 5 years old by September 1st of the current school year to be eligible to enroll in kindergarten. Students whose birthday falls after September 1st can be considered by a school district for early enrollment in kindergarten, but they must turn 5 by January 1st of the current school year.

Open Enrollment (ARS 15-816.01)

- Arizona has a broad open enrollment policy which allows families to apply for open enrollment for their children to attend the **public school** of their choice in Arizona. Open enrollment is granted if a school can reasonably accommodate the student. Children who attend a school on open enrollment will not have access to school bus transportation. Families will need to provide their own transportation to school.

Advance/Remote Enrollment (ARS 15-823.01)

- Military families executing PCS orders to a duty station in Arizona may enroll their K-12 child in an Arizona public school without having to provide proof of residency/address. Enrollment can be completed prior to physical arrival. Families must furnish proof of Arizona address (can include temporary billeting) to their child's school within 10 days of their official date of arrival. This statute applies to public and charter schools only.

Military Interstate Compact (ARS 15-1911)

- This statute implements Arizona's participation in the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children (MIC3) and provides guidance on enrollment, placement, attendance, eligibility, and graduation for military-connected students. Enrollment Documents

- Arizona requires the following documents for children to enroll in public school:
 - Child's original birth certificate*
 - Proof of Arizona Residency**
 - Immunization Records (within 30 days)
 - Valid Parent/Guardian Contact Information
 - Proof of Withdrawal from Previous School

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- Most Recent Report Card

*Parents can provide an unofficial copy until the genuine certificate can be furnished in person.

**Military parents have 10 days after their official arrival date to provide proof of Arizona residency. Refer to ARS 15-823.01 for more information on accepted forms of proof such as temporary billeting. This exception allows military families to remotely enroll their children in school prior to their arrival in Yuma.

Registration

Registration for school can be completed in a variety of ways, depending on the school. For virtually all Yuma schools, registration documents and instructions can be found on a school's website. Families can typically provide all documentation electronically or, if they prefer, can wait until their arrival in Yuma and go to the school to drop off their registration packet and required documents. If you have questions on how to register your child for school, contact the school registrar directly.

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Homeschooling Information

Families in Arizona have the option to homeschool. If you decide to homeschool your child, you are required to complete an Affidavit of Intent and send it to the Yuma County Superintendent's office within 30 days from the day the child begins homeschool. If you choose to homeschool, please also remember to notify the Yuma County Superintendent's office if you move out of Yuma County so they can remove your child from the roll of homeschooled children.

Arizona law requires all homeschooled students to, at a minimum, receive instruction in reading, grammar, math, science, and social studies. There are various support groups in Yuma to assist families who homeschool. For more information on homeschooling and supports, contact the Yuma County Superintendent's office or the School Liaison Officer. The School Liaison is available to provide guidance to families who wish to homeschool.

****Important:** please note that when you enroll your child in a virtual charter school or other online public school, your child is *by law* considered a public-school student and not a homeschool student.**

AZ Empowerment Scholarship Accounts (ESA)

“What is an ESA?”

An Empowerment Scholarship Account (ESA) is an account administered by the Arizona Department of Education (ADE) and funded by state tax dollars to provide education options for qualified Arizona students.

An ESA consists of 90% of the state funding that would have otherwise been allocated to the school district or charter school for the qualified student (does not include federal or local funding). By accepting an ESA, the student's parent or guardian is signing a contract agreeing to provide an education that includes at least the following subjects: reading, grammar, mathematics, social studies and science. ESA funding can be used to pay private school tuition, for curriculum, home education, tutoring and more.

Can my student participate in the ESA Program and remain his/her public or charter school?

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In almost all situations, students on ESA cannot be enrolled in a public school (this includes district, charter and public online programs). This is a violation of the ESA contract. Additionally, the student must be withdrawn from the public school at the time that the ESA contract is signed. If the state is paying for an ESA student's education at the same time as the student is receiving ESA funds, the state is distributing the student's education funding twice. You may be able to pay for certain public school programs utilizing your student's ESA funds, please contact us for more details.” – Arizona Department of Education

The School Liaison is available to help explain ESA program parameters and help parents make an informed decision when choosing to apply for the program. If you need technical assistance with the application or assistance with any function regarding your ESA account, you will need to contact the ESA Department directly for assistance.

Student Tuition Organizations - Tax Credit Scholarships

Arizona families can utilize tuition assistance from registered student tuition organizations (STO's) to pay for tuition to private schools *if they qualify*. Families who apply for tax-credit scholarships from student tuition organizations *may not* also use Empowerment Scholarship Account funds to pay for private school tuition. Families who wish to receive scholarships through these tuition organizations need to apply directly with the organization. Local organizations in Yuma are the Yuma's Education Scholarship Fund for Kids, Inc. (YES) and School Tuition Assistance of Yuma, Inc. (STAY) and others. These are registered not-for-profit 501(c)3 student tuition organizations authorized by the Arizona Department of Revenue to accept tax credit donations to create scholarships for students. Families can apply to multiple STO's and stack scholarships.

What does each letter grade mean?

A (excellent): Distinguished performance on the statewide assessment, significant student growth, high four-year graduation rates, students on track to proficiency; overall performance is significantly higher than the state average.

B (highly performing): High performance on statewide assessment and/or significant student growth and/or higher four-year graduation rates and/or moving students to proficiency at a higher rate than the state average.

C (performing): Adequate performance but needs improvement on some indicators, such as proficiency, growth or graduation rate.

D (minimally performing): Inadequate performance in proficiency, growth and/or four-year graduation rate relative to the state average.

F (failing): Systematic failures in proficiency, growth and graduation rates (below 67%); performance is in the bottom 5% of the state.

What goes into determining schools' A-F Letter Grades?

A-F Letter Grades use state test results, English learner test results, attendance, special education metrics, graduation rates and progress towards graduation.
